Health Survey for England (HSE) reports

The HSE is an annual survey of a nationally-representative sample of the general population living in private homes in England. Each year, the survey has a new sample and a different focus in addition to the core elements. The afternoon will start by explaining how HSE data collection has changed due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Little data were collected in 2020, so a report on the health of minority ethnic groups in England using data from 2011 to 2019 will be published in summer 2022. We will present how these data are being analysed, and will also include our work on self-reported and measured height and weight; some secondary analyses of HSE data; and findings from PhD students who previously presented their early findings.
